Introduce yourself, state your purpose, and ask permission.

We're exploring the spiritual contours of this year's election. Want to participate?

Hi, I'm ______. What's your name? We're from InterVarsity Christian Fellowship and we're inviting the [school name here] community to explore the spiritual dimensions of this year's political election. We're having people go through this interactive display to think about the election in light of Christian spirituality.

2. Invite them to share their concerns.

Use 1 or more display questions, for example: What do you think are the most pressing problems in the U.S.? Where are we in desperate need of change?

3. Ask for their opinions about the possibilities for change.

Use 1 or more display questions, for example: What would it take to see real change in the U.S.? Do you have faith in the political system to bring about the kind of change you long for?

4. Optional question and transition. Otherwise, go directly to step 5.

This is obviously a silly question, but if God were voting, who do you think he'd vote for? Why?

But seriously...one of the things we're exploring is how God might be relevant to these issues and essential in bringing about real change in the U.S. and the world.

5. Transition to their opinion about connecting world problems and faith.

Use 1 or more display questions, for example: What role, if any, do you think God or faith could play in solving the problems in the world?

6. After listening to their answers, ask if you can share what God has to do with all of this.

Would you be interested in hearing a Christian perspective on how the central story of Christianity has brought about systemic transformation in the world?

If "no," thank them, ask for contact information, and give them InterVarsity information. If "yes," continue to step 7.

7. Share examples of 1 or more of the historical figures.

Obviously, terrible things have happened in the name of Christianity in the past and even today. However, over the last 2,000 years, some of the most transformative ideas, social movements, and organizations have been inspired by the life and teachings of Jesus:

Human rights Child labor laws Non-profits Hospitals

Women's suffrage Orphanages Universities

Homeless shelters Civil rights movements

We show these four historical figures because they're examples of how faith—particularly faith in Jesus—played an important role in their bringing significant change to the world.

- Martin Luther King, Jr. was inspired by his faith. In fact, he said it was central to everything he did.
- William Wilberforce's faith in Jesus was his central driving factor to eliminating slavery.
- Mother Teresa's relationship with God pressed her into the slums of Calcutta to rescue thousands from extreme poverty.
- Desmond Tutu's spiritual beliefs were inspiration to advocate for the oppressed in South Africa.



8. Share the gospel. (Sample dialogue provided—you do *not* need to memorize.)

All of these people were motivated by this story...

When we look around us at the world, we can see it's pretty messed up: Injustice, global poverty, the environmental crisis, the AIDS epidemic, and the economic crisis are just a few things that have happened recently.

But what's interesting is the way we respond. We actually long for a better world deep inside, and either we get really excited about our favorite political candidate as a means of bringing positive change, or we bury our feelings deep inside and may become cynical. But, somewhere inside, we know things are screwed up and we long for a better world.

Just as hunger points us to food or thirst points us to water, this longing for a better world would seem to point us to the possibility that a better world either did exist or will one day exist.

Draw the four worlds of the New World gospel outline, if possible.

In the Christian worldview, a better world did exist. Humans were originally **DESIGNED FOR GOOD**. God made humanity to bear his image—his love, his reason, his care. In the Bible, there is a story of a garden, in which humanity lived in perfect harmony with God, with each other, and with the environment.

But then humanity—whether literally or figuratively—turned away from God and we tried to put ourselves in the center. And we messed everything up. Our relationship with God, with each other, and with the environment were damaged. We were **DAMAGED BY EVIL**.

But this was a problem for God—because he loved humanity and wanted a relationship with us—and so the only way that he could restore this relationship is by actually becoming a human and taking on all the suffering and pain that humans had brought into the world. In the Christian story, God becomes a human, Jesus, and lives among us and teaches us, and then ultimately, dies in our place. He took all the pain, sorrow, and damage humanity had brought into the world to the grave with him. And then, he rose again. And now he's actually alive and invites anyone who wants to to be joined with him and to begin to experience new life. We can actually be restored to relationship with God. We are **RESTORED FOR BETTER**.

But this isn't the end of the story, because even though we can be restored to God, the world is still pretty messed up. And so it's not just enough to be connected to God, he actually wants to build a new community, with his Spirit at the center, and then send us out together to heal and restore. As we're restored and healed by God on the inside, we become the instruments of his restoration and are **SENT TO HEAL** the world.

At this point, some people wonder why can't we just go from being damaged by evil to sent together to heal? Well, the reason is that the evil that we face is not just outside us—out there—it's actually in every one of us, inside us. There is evil in the world system, but that system is made up of us. We actually need to be changed and renewed from inside, before we can do anything really radical. Obviously there are many people who can do a lot of good for a while, but to really change the world, you need to change not only systems, but the people in them.

When we truly experience healing from God and calling from him, we can make an incredible difference in the world. In fact, other people will experience God's restoration through us. That is the story of Martin Luther King, Jr. or William Wilberforce or Mother Teresa or Desmond Tutu.

9. Invite them to respond.

What do you think about that story? Does it resonate with you?

(Point to your drawing of the New World gospel presentation) What world would you put self in?
