Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

Why should we include ministry growth in an evangelism plan?

Planning for growth forces us to think outside of the box, and helps us intentionally consider the needs of those not yet in the room. We have to ask questions about welcoming new people, their first impressions of us, and how to make their joining our community smoother. Jesus regularly reminded the disciples to practice welcoming, even when it was inconvenient. In Mark 10:13-16, the disciples thought that children were a nuisance. Not Jesus. He took them into his arms and blessed them. Planning for growth opens the arms of our community in a healthy way. May God use this process of creating goals and plans to help us shake free from the slumber of our complacency.

Why goals?

Goals help us clarify our mission. Goals can help us discern the scale of outreach, check our progress along the way, and help us make wise mid-course adjustments as needed. Setting numerical goals can press us toward clear communication and one-mindedness between leaders and planning teams. May God use our goal setting to help us set clear priorities, and work through possible disagreements. "Whenever you set a numerical goal, ask the 'why' question. Why does this matter to me? Why SHOULD this matter to me?" (borrowed from Andy Stanley's leadership podcast, 2013)

Why count?

In Acts 2, Luke shows us a vivid picture of a thriving community, and he also intentionally lists the actual number of baptisms. What is the impact on the reader when Luke tells us there were 3,000 baptisms that day? Somebody's arms were sore from dunking people! We are in awe of the size of the movement of the Holy Spirit. Having numbers helps us see and celebrate the God moment. In addition, every evangelism breakthrough creates a new set of problems. The Apostles shift from leading a movement of 120 to 3,000+ overnight. They immediately have to adjust their expectations (Acts 2:37-42).

Why make plans?

Plans help us align our programs to our goals. If we only set goals but do not create plans, we seldom make progress. Plans can help in our communication, so that when we recruit volunteers they know what we expect of them. Good plans also help us sequence the change process we are leading. However, only God brings the growth. No plan can ever create new life. We must never put our trust in our plans, nor in our "chariots." (Isaiah 31:1)

What is a Gospel Event?*

Any event that is:

- 1. Geared toward non-Christians
- 2. Your congregation intentionally invites non-Christians to
- 3. The Gospel and Jesus are introduced

(Common examples include the Alpha course and Christianity Explored. See below.)

"Can our other events build toward one or more Gospel Events?"

Yes, seekers and skeptics need a chance to warm up to Jesus and your church. Using the metaphor of a house, every church needs a "front porch" where guests can get to know you and Jesus before coming into your home. Some churches build trust through hosting sporting events, picnics or kids events. What kind of front porch might you want to create?





Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What is a confession of faith?

A confession of faith is one phrase to describe what is happening for someone spiritually when they acknowledge Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Other churches or denominations might use phrases like, "being saved," or "became a Christian," "born again," or "decided to follow Jesus."

What is Alpha?

Alpha is a fruitful ministry that creates a safe journey for skeptics and seekers to explore faith at their own pace. Here is how Alpha describes themselves: "Alpha offers content and guidance for churches, ministries, and individuals to create a space for honest and open conversations about life's biggest questions. Everyone is welcome and no questions are off limits."
